Manoeuvres in the Marsh

Back in 2012 Louise Brown, a teacher and musician living in Bambra, wanted to create a community orchestra. An experienced cellist, Louise established a music practice 16 years ago when she volunteered to start a music program at Deans Marsh Primary School where her three children attended. Birregurra, Forrest and Beac and Alvie Primary Schools have since adopted her program and all have produced impressive results. Louise has a passion for getting others involved in singing and making music, and so, together with her collaborators, Lisa Jarvis and Jane Gorman, they got together a group of people from the community and decided that the name for the group of singers and instrumentalists would be a derivation of the name of an orchestral pop group from the 70s. And so was formed "Orchestral Manoeuvres in the Marsh" or OMM for short.

Louise has an extensive record of engaging the passion, energy and vitality of whole towns through creative music projects. With the support of Festivals Australia, the OMM Rock Choir went on to produce a large-scale music performance

involving the local community at the Deans Marsh Festival. More than 160 participants performed in this first event, including the voices of a combined adult and children's choir accompanied by of an orchestra of local musicians, marching percussionists, dancers, didgeridoo players and even whip crackers. The lifetime arts experience of Tony Watts and Genevieve Picot was harnessed to stage the event whilst Brendan Brown provided the sound and technical support. Deb Rhodes was brought in to film the entire process and photographers Renee Wigly and Stuart Fry were on hand to capture the many special moments.

When you find something that the community can embrace ... it gets a life of its own ... and there are many social, cultural and community benefits. Since that beginning, the OMM team have unearthed, nurtured, encouraged and delivered over 1000 new performance artists to Victoria's music community..

Performances have taken place at Performing Arts Festivals in Lorne, Deans Marsh, Birregurra, Anglesea, Colac and Forrest. Best of all, the talented individuals

who make up the ever changing OMM Choir and Percussion group have created something that is extraordinary and unique to our region in South Western Victoria.

An upcoming event for OMM is the Deans Marsh 2018 'Carols by Candlelight' which is put on by Deans Marsh Community Cottage and Cricket club each year. Held on Sunday December 17, from 6pm, it is a great family event and a wonderful, music filled opportunity to catch up with neighbors and friends.

Next week, we will continue the story of OMM with news of a new, exciting project planned for early 2018.
